ACCOMMODATION - TERMS, CONDITIONS AND RATES

- All attendees are to make their own reservations by using the booking links provided via email or on the ALCA website. You can also book on the Grand Geneva Resort or Timber Ridge website using code 2306ALCA;
- To confirm your reservation, a deposit of 1 night's lodging plus tax is required;
- The balance of the cost of your accommodation is payable directly to the hotel on departure;
- Hotel require 14 day cancellation. As our rate includes meals, they need to plan in advance for number of guests;
- Reservations must be made by May 22, 2023. Room block may not cover all room requests so we encourage you to book early to get a room as well as your room preference;
- Rate is \$229 + tax for Monday night and then is \$440 per night for a single Tuesday through Thursday. The \$440 rate includes 3 group meals per day as part of our package; Double rate is \$610 per night which includes 3 group meals per day for two people;
- There are 3 different room categories and all are being offered at the same price:
- o Deluxe Courtside / Lakeside: These rooms are in the main building and are traditional hotel rooms with either 1 or 2 beds and a private balcony or patio
- o Studio / 1 Bedroom Villas: These rooms are located in buildings near the main resort building. Each villa has a fully furnished kitchen and a pool / patio area only accessible by villa guests. These rooms are ideal for those looking for more privacy or those bringing a guest
- o Timber Ridge 1 bedroom suite: These rooms are located in the adjacent property on the complex which is their indoor waterpark hotel. All rooms are furnished with 1 or 2 beds and a full kitchen. Daily rate at this property includes 4 waterpark passes. This property is great for those bringing a family with them.
 - o All the above properties can be accessed using the 24 hour trolley service provided by the resort.

During this time he was based in Menomonee Falls WI, and was assigned with technical sales responsibilities for the Mid West region and Mexico. In June 2002 BASF once again BASF relocated Goetz to Leon Mexico. He was promoted to Leather Sales Manager for the Mexico and Central America region. After 4 years Goetz returned to the US, and was based at BASF's NAFTA headquarters in Charlotte, NC. Beginning in 2007 Goetz became the Regional Sales Manager for NAFTA, and in 2011 he joined Tannin Corporation continuing as Regional Sales Manager for NAFTA and as of today he is the VP of sales and he is also in charge of Tannin Mexico.
- ◆ Janio Rocha has a Leather Technician degree from Centro Tecnologico do Couro SENAI/RS/Brazil, has been in the Leather industry since 2005, works in three different countries (Brazil, Uruguay and US), and has had different roles from production, quality and sales departments. - 2019 he became part of National Beef Leathers as a Technical Manager and on November of 2021 accumulated the Sales Director Position.
